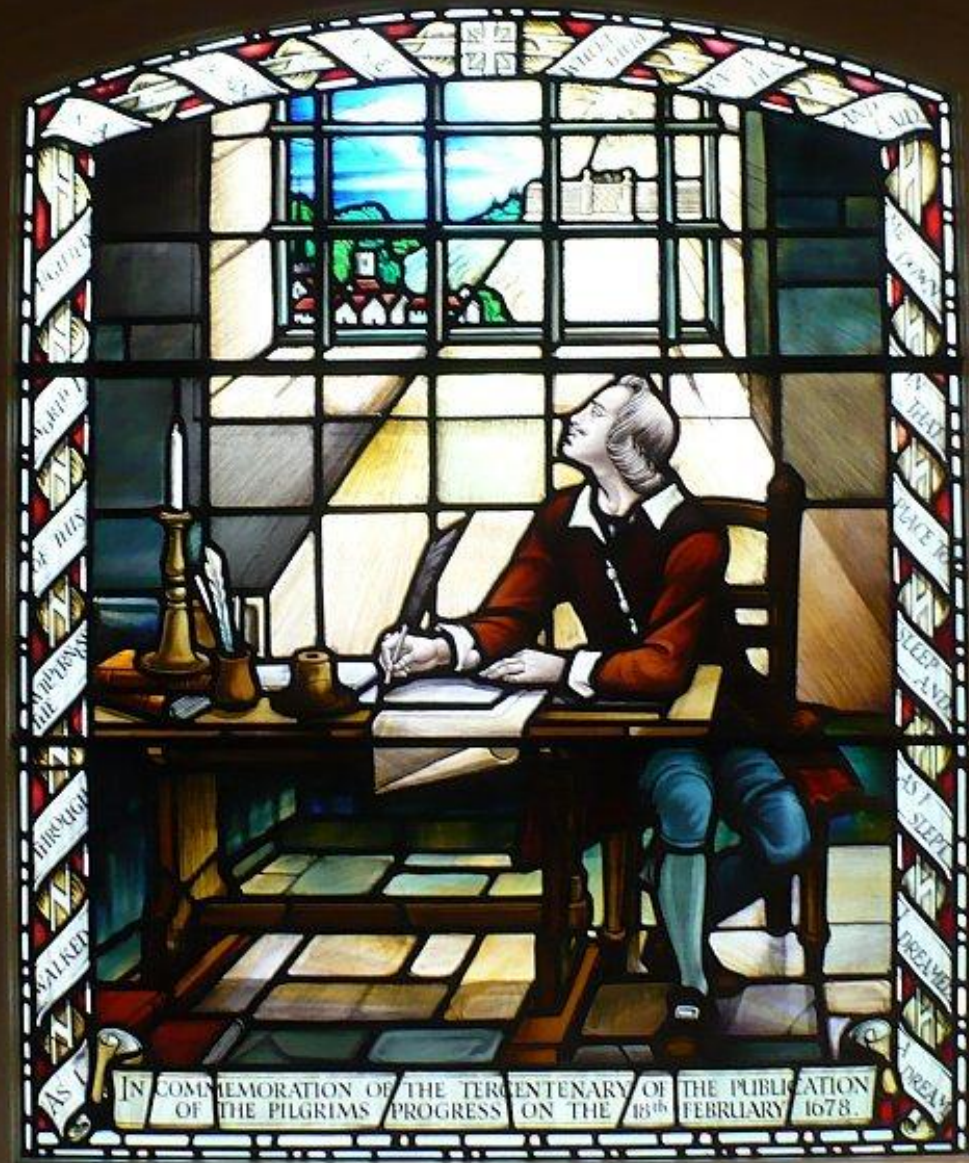

1660 - 1672

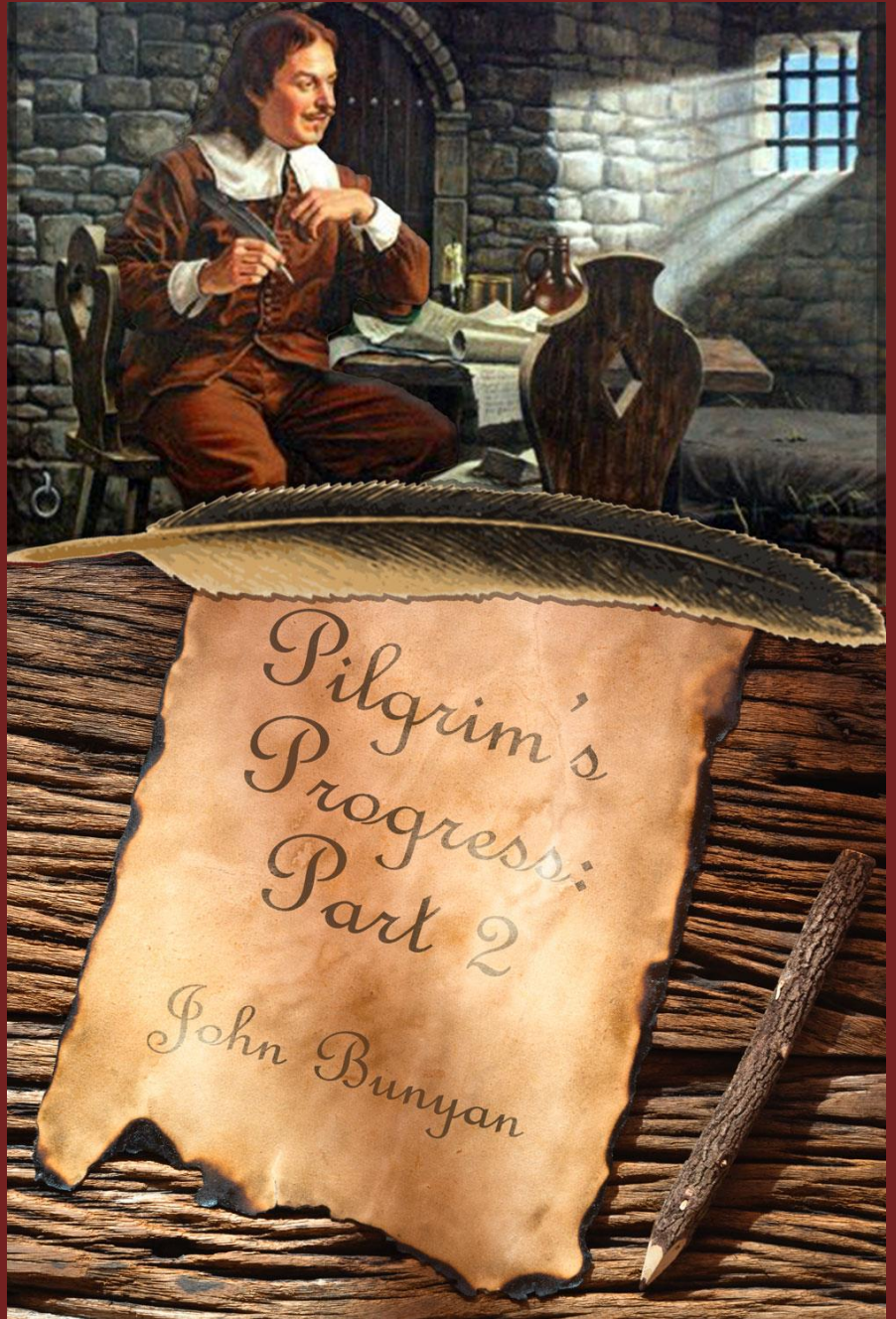


IN COMMEMORATION OF THE TERCENTENARY OF THE PUBLICATION

Thus have I in few words written to you before I die. . . Because I desire that you may have the life laid up for all them that believe in the Lord Jesus and love one another when I am deceased.

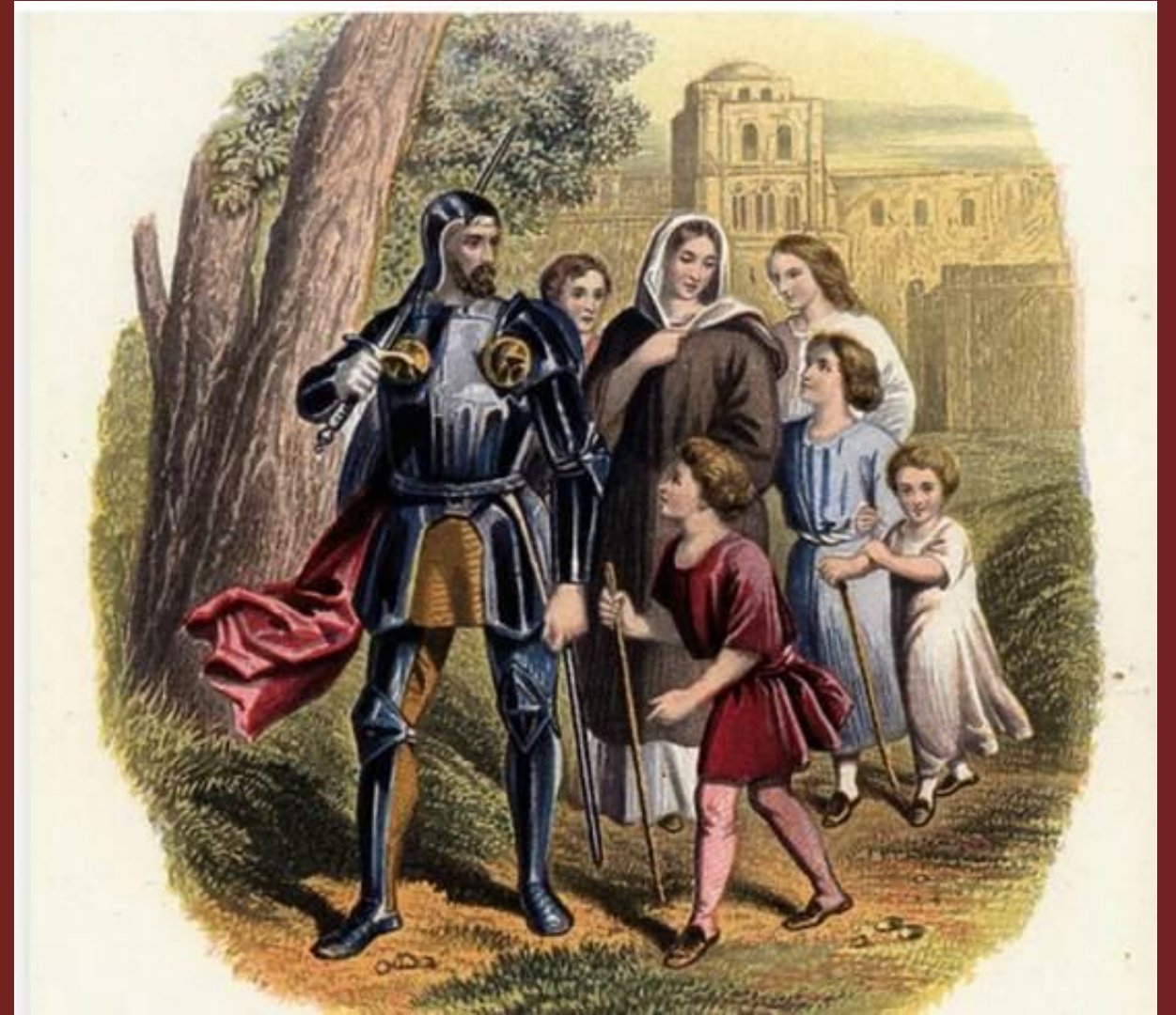
