

Upon what righteous basis may God justify the ungodly?

But to the one who does not work, but believes in <u>Him who</u> <u>justifies the ungodly</u>, his faith is credited as righteousness (NASB; Rom. 4:5).

He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him (NASB; II Cor. 5:21).

For the demonstration, *I say*, of His righteousness at the present time, <u>so that He would be just and the justifier</u> of the one who has faith in Jesus (NASB; Rom. 3:26).

More than that, I count all things to be loss in view of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them but rubbish so that I may gain Christ, and may be found in Him, not having a righteousness of my own derived from the Law, but that which is through faith in Christ, the righteousness which comes from God on the basis of faith (NASB; Phil. 3:8-9).

The only righteous basis upon which God may justify the ungodly is by imputing unto them Christ's very own sinless righteousness.

It is not simply **because** of this righteousness that Jehovah justifies; but by **legally transferring** it to us, so that we can use it, and plead it, and appear before God in it, just as if it were wholly our own.... The transaction is not one of **borrowing**. The perfection made over to us is **given**, not **lent**, by God. It becomes ours in law; ours for all legal ends; ours as efficaciously as if it had been from first to last our own in very deed.
