Now that we are getting older and our children are leaving the nest, how is our job of being a “worker at home” changing?

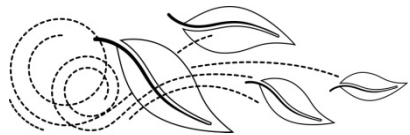
