Character Defined

The stable and distinctive qualities built into an individual's life which determine his response regardless of circumstances (American Dictionary).

Character in reality

True character is what God knows us to be. The test of our character is what we do when no one is watching. Character is really what we have been becoming by the choices that we make and continue to make. The reality of our character is shown in our integrity, convictions and moral courage.

*Integrity-honesty, reliability, uprightness *Convictions-persuasion *Courage-endurance


Christian Character

A Christian is a new creature with a divine nature. Christian character is displayed by the <u>seriousness</u> of a person's relationship with Christ and his desire to live godly (2 Cor. 5:17; 2 Pet. 1:4).

Character is not made in a crisis, it is only exhibited in the time of crisis. Character is reflected in *every* <u>decision</u> we make and *every* <u>relationship</u> we establish. There are no shortcuts to true Christian character.

Importance of training character by training the mind

- To please and glorify God out of gratitude in response for what Christ has done in my life (I Cor. 10:31; Rom. 12:1)
- To obey the <u>high calling</u> of assisting our teens as they continue growing in the maturity in Christ (Col. 1:28, 29)
- To help in the acceptance and credibility of our young person's testimony for Christ. *Walk talks and talk walks* (Matt. 5:16)
- To have a part in determining their destiny (Gal. 6:7-8)



- God's Word commands that we have a <u>vital role</u> in teaching and training the minds and character of our teens (Deut. 6:6-7)
- It helps our family serve the LORD (Josh. 24:15b)
- It protects them from wrong associations (1 Cor. 15:33)
- It helps them not to have a worldly appearance (1 Thess. 5:22)
- It helps them to make pre-decisions regarding circumstances and problems, and helps them determine to do what is right, before the situation to do wrong threatens them (Prov. 2:11)

Considerations concerning the training of mind and character:

- It will be a <u>life-long</u> process, one in which the Lord gives us the high calling to be a co-laborer with Him for a very <u>limited time</u> (Eph. 5:16)
- It will be blessed when we cooperate with the Holy Spirit (Eph. 4:30)
- It will involve self-assessment and repentance concerning sin (Ps. 51)
- It will require mutual responsibility and accountability of parents and their teens in a humble manner (1 Pet. 5:5)
- It will necessitate a kind, loving ministry as we unselfishly and positively try to help in areas we discern need strengthening (Eph. 4:32)
- It will take grace to pass on to our children what God has taught us (Ps. 78:6-7)
- It will involve knowing and being able to speak God's truth in love (Rom. 12:10)
- It will involve dealing with the real enemy in our human nature (Jer. 17:7-10)
- It will necessitate a pilgrim-like attitude (Heb. 11:10)
- It will involve the challenge of thinking God's thoughts after Him (Is. 55:8-9)
- It will involve working with our teens at a <u>very delicate</u> time in their lives (Eccl. 12:1)



Effective Resources for Character Training

- Prayer: Life is a vapor, handle it with prayer. Prayers count for eternity.
- Psalm 119: Walking the Way of the Word
- Book of Proverbs
- <u>Assimilating</u> and sharing the Word of God by reading, memorizing and meditating
- Study the life of Christ: Behold the Living Word in the Written Word.
- Study God's attributes in the Old Testament (mercy, longsuffering, faithfulness, goodness, compassion, moderation)
- Study Paul the Apostle: our human example
- Bible characters (i.e. Daniel: self-controlled, trustworthy, humble...)
- Parental example of character development
- People and circumstances of today (God's Word is reality)
- Books: Effective leaders are <u>diligent</u> readers of good books and diligent readers of good books are effective leaders.

 - o Resource books for Christian living and growth

Evidences of seeing the blessings of Christian character in

the process

- When they are truly regenerated, there will be outward responses to an inward possession. *Not modified behavior to meet a standard* (2 Cor. 5:17)
- When they long to be pursuing and relying on God's Word, love and grace daily (Ps. 42:1)
- When they become consistent in prayer time (Jn. 16:24)
- When they are more concerned about God's glory than their own pursuits or even their reputation (Job 13:15)
- When we see them demonstrate humility (Eph. 4:1-3)
- When they display the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23)
- When they view their current crisis as a faith builder for the future (Jer. 29:11)
- When they praise God in the natural flow of conversation (Ps. 119:164)

Present neglect to train the minds and character of young people may lead to later risk and/or future regret. Parental dependency on God, commitment, bard work, dedication, attention, diligence and creativity will be needed.

God's plan for maturing Christian teens is that they be <u>transformed</u> and <u>conformed</u> into the image of His dear Son. (2 Cor. 3:18; Rom. 8:29)

Training Minds and Character According to Biblical Convictions

- 1. The Bible is the inspired Word (2 Tim. 3:16)
- True purpose in life is to love God by giving Him my <u>trust</u> and pursuing <u>wisdom</u> to do what is right, even when it is hard (Josh. 22:5; 2 Tim. 2:3-4)
- 3. Viewing my body as the temple of God (I Cor. 3:16-17)
- 4. Attending a church that teaches the foundational truths of the Bible (Matt. 7:15-16)
- 5. Maintain actions that will not weaken Scriptural convictions of other believers (Rom. 14:13)
- 6. Viewing marriage as a life-long commitment (Matt. 19:6-7)
- 7. Money is a trust from God to be used wisely (Lk. 16:11)
- 8. Words in harmony with God's Word, especially when speaking to others (Gal. 6:1)
- 9. Affections being set on things above, not on things in the earth (Col. 3:2)
- 10. God has a plan for each individual. Striving to obey His Will promotes His glory and blesses us. (Jer. 29:11)

Difficult issues need to be addressed and these issues <u>must</u> line up with the Bible convictions established by us as parents. We need to be <u>sensitive</u> to the Lord's leading and the Holy Spirit's promptings. Each person stands accountable to God for the path they pursue. There will be times of failure, but God knows our heart and the intention of what we pursue in life.

Each person must examine his own work, and then he will have reason for boasting in regard to himself alone, and not in regard to another. For each one will bear his own load (Galatians 6:4-5).
