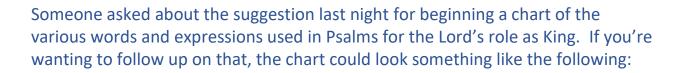
## Good morning, Everybody.

You can include as many columns as there are distinctive words or expressions that you find repeated (like, dominion, Most High, etc.). Some of you are spreadsheet savvy and could do this very efficiently.

One thing you'll want to avoid is befuddling yourself endlessly with the question of whether or not to increase your columns with words or expressions that **can be traced back** to God's sovereignty/lordship, **but which don't actually express it distinctively**. For instance, He couldn't smite His enemies (3:7) or make us dwell in safety (4:8) unless He were Lord of all. But these Divine acts aren't **highlighting** His lordship, even though they wouldn't be possible apart from it.



Anyway. . . my point is that you won't want to get "hung" trying to decide what to include in your chart. The project will work best and be most satisfying if you narrow it to the specific concept of His lordship.
