## Good afternoon, Everybody.

Welcome to the last day of the week; the seventh day. God's creative work began on the first day of the week (our Sunday). It continued through six days, and then on the seventh day *He rested from all His work which He had done* (Genesis 2:2).



Our work week, however, begins on its *second* day (Monday). Resulting, of course, in today's being our sixth for labor, though it is the week's seventh.

But what that means in the weekly rhythm of the New Covenant is that once we finish today, tomorrow is all smiles. We rest from all our work which we have done. No sweat of the brow, no *thorns and thistles* for a whole day!

Almost every Lord's Day (probably *every* Lord's Day), my mind involuntarily recalls the first line of one of John Newton's *Olney Hymns*.

Safely through another week (emphasis mine), God has brought us on our way; Let us now a blessing seek, Waiting in His courts today.

Day of all the week the best, Emblem of eternal rest. Day of all the week the best, Emblem of eternal rest. (John Newton)

The first day of the week, the Lord's Day, actually does require a good deal of labor in the forms of service which we render to the Lord; just as the sabbath did for the priests and Levites. But for them, it was apparently no contradiction to the intent and rightful use of the day. Have you not read in the Law, that on the Sabbath the priests in the temple break the Sabbath and are innocent (Matthew 12:5)?

So for us, serving the LORD God on the first day of the week, though it is often demanding bodily, should be a joy of joys. *I love my master*, a slave of old was given the lawful right to claim, *I will not go out as a free man* (Exodus 21:5). He could have. He could have gone out as a *free man*; that is, as a man now liberated to do as he pleased. But he was also given the right, the legal right, to choose differently. And if he did, his master could not refuse him. The master was bound to keep him; to shelter, clothe, feed, protect, and make use of him.

Why would a slave choose to remain a *slave* (!)? Because he'd been treated so well by his new master, that he had come to *love* him. Far, far better to love and serve than to turn from loving and being loved in order to run free with abandon.

Would **you** not rather be a *doorkeeper* (which did require time, attention, and responsibility) on the Lord's Day than to turn yourself free to ramble lazily about *in the tents of wickedness* (Psalm 84:10)? And remember, the Book of Psalms knows of only *two* groups of people, not *three*. Don't let your mind begin to imagine and covet a pleasant group of the in-between; not doorkeepers, but not exactly wicked either. God apparently doesn't know of such an imaginary category.
